Six years ago, the Society agreed to take on *Cynwyd Train Station Revitalization Project* and restore and repurpose the old 1890 PRR station. We have accomplished this goal; the first floor is used as a waiting room for the commuters, a trailhead information area, and a Victorian ice cream parlor and green community center with the second floor remodeled into caretaker apartment. The SEPTA station remains active on the *Cynwyd regional rail line*, is located along the *Cynwyd Heritage Trail*, and is adjacent to the one-acre *Cynwyd Station Park*. Come and meet many of your elected officials for the DEDICATION of the *Cynwyd Station Capital Campaign Memorial Plaque* that recognizes the organizations and people who made this revitalization a reality.


In addition, there will be the UNVEILING the '*Preserve America*' Cynwyd Heritage Trail Interpretive Signs. The U.S Department of Interior has designated the Township of Lower Merion a *Preserve America Community* and awarded the Township a *Preserve America Grant* to fund the development and manufacture of interpretive signs for the *Cynwyd Heritage Trail*. It has been a collaborative effort between the Township and the Historical Society's volunteers. These sixteen informative signs (24"x36") have been installed by the Township's Parks and Recreation Department along the trail to provide users of the Heritage Trail with information about the heritage of this 19th century industrial corridor.



To add to the festivities, in the **Cynwyd Station Park** there will be *The Second Annual Craft Fair and* (*Mostly*) *Native Plant Sale*. Join us for a deliriously good time, perusing the goods of local crafters, from natural beauty products, to jewelry, to handmade prints and enjoy some ice cream and milk shakes. Buy some (mostly) native plants for your garden. All proceeds go towards the rare native demonstration garden at *Cynwyd Station Park*.

Building Photographs - Preserving Today for Tomorrow's History

The April photo from our **<u>Buildings web</u>** shows part of our changing history:



The Cynwyd Station opened in 1890 as a depot for passenger, baggage, and freight traffic. This photo was taken by John Dziobko Jr. in 1965, when it was a commuter station run by Penn Central, successor to the Pennsylvania Railroad. The Montgomery Ave. bridge over the tracks is dated 1926; it was rebuilt in 1972.

Frank Karreman found this photo in "Pennsylvania Railroad Facilities in Color – Volume 3: Philadelphia Division" by Robert J Yanosey. Railfans can read the book at the Academy.
