Revitalization of the Cynwyd Train Station A Holiday Gift Opportunity

Our Capital Campaign is still ongoing and we are getting closer to completing this 5-year long renovation. Funding to close out any project can be the hardest money to raise. The Cynwyd Train Station, located at 375 Conshohocken State Road in Bala Cynwyd, is now available for lease. This prime space is 640 square feet and is located on the first floor of the building. Cynwyd Train Station is a stop on SEPTA's Cynwyd Line, with a SEPTA parking lot, a municipal parking lot (Cynwyd Station Lot 15 with short & long-term metered parking and permit parking), a trailhead for the Cynwyd Heritage Trail, and is adjacent to the Township's

This photo from our Buildings web is part of our changing history.



In 1848 Abraham Levering named this property Illinova. Two of his sons lived on the property, one on each side of the turnpike. By about 1857 this part belonged to another family – first William G Lesher and later *Miss* Kate Lesher. By 1926 it became Margaret Taylor's store.

The building is now twice as wide but one third of it is the same. Click <u>here</u> to see how what hasn't changed.
