At the <u>Trails End Café at Cynwyd Station</u> 375 Conshohocken State Road in Bala Cynwyd Located at the Terminus of the Cynwyd Heritage Trail



Founded in 1833, the *Philadelphia and Reading Railroad*, aka, *The Reading*, was one of the earliest public access railroads in the United States. The Main Line of the Reading Railroad runs the entire length of the river border of Lower Merion. Thus, Lower Merion is unique in being home to two major main lines –

The Reading RR and The Pennsylvania RR.

The History of *The Reading RR* is rarely discussed and scantly recorded in much of our history and yet as the largest business corporation of its time, and the largest railroad corporation at the height of the Age of Railways in the US, the history of the Reading and its influence on America is very worthy of greater notice.

By learning more about the Reading, your knowledge and interest in local history as well as American History will be greatly enhanced.



This lecture and discussion will be led by Perry Hamilton, Secretary of The Lower Merion Historical Society.

Perry, a lifelong resident of Lower Merion & Narberth, has been assigned by The Lower Merion Historical Society to raise awareness of the Reading RR in our local history and develop a library of sources of this subject.

The Great War: Lower Merion's Centennial Celebration



Come join us on **Sunday, November 11th 2018** for 100th Anniversary of *Armistice Day* (today celebrated as *Veterans Day*) at the *Merion (War) Tribute House* located at 625 Hazelhurst Avenue in Merion. It will be an open house family friendly celebration from 3:00pm to 5:00pm. This free event, with plenty of free parking, is open to the general public. We have planned an afternoon of **Remembrances** along with many educational exhibits and speakers.

Here is a brief story of one of the **Remembrances**. In the spring of 1915, shortly after losing a friend in Ypres, a Canadian doctor, Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae was inspired by the sight of poppies growing in battle-scarred fields to write a now famous poem called 'In Flanders Fields'. After the First World War, the poppy was adopted as a symbol of **Remembrance**.

> In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place; and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the Dead. Short days ago

We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie In Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe: To you from failing hands we throw The torch; be yours to hold it high. If ye break faith with us who die We shall not sleep, though poppies grow In Flanders fields.

There is an Apartment Available for Rent at the Cynwyd Train Station



The Works of William Penn by William Penn

This publication is a complete set of Penn's writings and epistles which was published in 1726. It is printed in an oversized format in 2 volumes; Volume 1 is 911 pages, Volume 2 is 916 pages.

The formidable title of this anthology is:

"The Works of William Penn: The Guide Mistaken, & Temporizing rebuked: or, A Brief Reply to Jonathan Clapham's Book, intitled, A Guide to the True Religion In Which His Religion is Confuted, His Hypocrisy is Detected, His Aspersons are Reprehended, His Contradictions are Compared."

This publication offers us a window into the past and an account of Penn's beliefs and dreams.
